Robert Horvath Artists Statement for White Gold

"Conventional scholarship shies away from divisive social issues," Christopher Reed writes in his Art and Homosexuality book published in 2011. This is why art must openly expose and challenge viewers. Today, American society is adjusting to new laws that grant gay and lesbian couples the ability to marry, more easily adopt children, file taxes jointly, and sponsor one another for legal immigration to the United States. Historically, passing controversial laws does not put issues to the rest; instead, the process re-ignites discussions that polarize us politically and socially. By passing anti-discrimination laws we have not erased the fact that minorities still are not treated equally, women are still paid less than their male counterparts, or that people of the LGBTQ community continue to be mistreated. We must not let these injustices remain unremarked in the wake of early legal victories.

This show is the first in a series of works for a proposed project, "Flamboyant Love: Rococo Sensibilities in Contemporary Gay Culture" which seeks to stimulate ongoing discussion of these issues by exploring the social discomfort still experienced in response to visual art that is grounded in queer notions of sexuality, responses that maintain the oppression and suppression of gay artists facing scrutiny from both social and academic realms. I plan to create a collection of large oil paintings on linen, fore-fronting visual and historical references to artworks of the Rococo style from the eighteenth century, focusing on the figurative porcelain compositions of the German and French regions.

For example, in Dresden, Meissen was the first successful brand of European porcelain, developed by Johann Friedrich Bottger in 1709. In time, European markets were able to sever their dependency on imports of Chinese and Japanese porcelain wares (so-called "china"). Meissen porcelain not only represented the ingenuity of a European manufacture with their so-called "white gold", it also allowed for the fabrication of new styles and objects. As a result, porcelain figurines become fashionable, a European "invention" that still enjoys widespread popularity to this day. Scenes from Greek mythology, costumed actors in famous theatrical roles, and scenes of flirtation and seduction were among the most popular motives represented in porcelain in mid eighteenth-century Europe.

Throughout the art history, aesthetic judgments went hand in hand with the mores of their time. The subject matter of artworks from the Rococo era demonstrates that the sensibilities of elite European art patrons ran to decadence, intemperance, luxury, lasciviousness, and individual hedonism. Highly fashionable male figures were often portrayed in a very effeminate fashion, which today would label them as patently homosexual. Whether they are understood to represent eighteenth-century 'fops,' 'libertines,' or merely avant-garde heterosexual stylists, they make today's viewer uncomfortable since our expectations are so different.

Many of the objects that porcelain factories such as Meissen and Sevres produced served as diplomatic tools among the competing politicians of the Prussian and Austrian states or within the French court. Ever more indicative of high value, the manufacturer created unique works assembled from hundreds of individually molded details and decorated with expensive raw materials. As examples of extremely lavish and extravagant objects that reflected a flamboyant lifestyle, I am interested in how these visual sensibilities translate and speak to our present gay culture. As the Gay Pride parade became an event for the general community to show support, the gay community turned it into a decadent debauchery full of hedonism and lack of moderation. Gay pride floats can be seen as large versions of Rococo porcelain soup tureens and multi-figural sculptural compositions made by the eighteenth-century porcelain factories. They lack moderation and a balanced aesthetic, becoming instruments that camouflaged over-sexualized behavior in plain view of the general public. Yet contemporary gay culture is not monolithic; the Gay Pride parades are caricatures of a lifestyle few follow, ignoring the variety and complexity of the vast numbers of real people who identify as gay. Surely the same was true of these privileged elites of the eighteenth century with their expensive porcelain trinkets.

In either period, this ostentatious sexual style of display engages the sensibilities of "Camp" art. It uses frivolity, self-indulgence, and theatricality, to draw the viewer in, but at the same time it strongly offends him/her. In her 1964 paper, Notes on Camp, Susan Sontag explained the difference between "Naive" and "Deliberate" Camp. Better-known "Kitsch" falls under the category of "Naive Camp," as it is unaware of its tastelessness. "Deliberate Camp," on the other hand, can be seen as a subversive form of kitsch, which deliberately exploits the whole notion of what it is to be kitsch. These works conform to the second designation.
